Since the new park was created in 2021 with inspiration from the ACCF-funded Targeted Action Plan and a boost from our \$125,000 grant to the city, Foundation Plaza has hosted everything from rock concerts to retirement parties. Families have gathered there for a big-screen movie night and posed for selfies there at Christmas time.

We're energized to see that leaders in the southern part of Ashland County are embarking on a community improvement plan. We've met with them and look forward to coming alongside them in any way we can as they envision and implement projects in that part of the county.



Another of our recent grants will fund an attractive and welcoming new mural on the side of a building at Union and Third Streets.

Several years ago, we provided six grants for improvements to downtown business façades, inspiring building owners to invest in the exterior appearance of their properties.

We also provided funding for the brick alleyway outside Uniontown Brewing Company, literally paving the way for downtown Ashland's first outdoor dining venue. Notably, three more outdoor dining areas have been created downtown since

The ongoing revitalization we all enjoy downtown is the result of efforts and investments from many organizations, government entities, businesses and individuals. We're proud to play a role on that team, and we look forward to what we will continue to accomplish as we come together downtown.

Investing in the local workforce

When workers have the resources to secure good-paying jobs and businesses have access to a skilled workforce, everyone wins.

ACCF is helping to bridge the gap between employers and prospective employees with three of our recent Community Grants:

- We provided North Central State College Foundation a grant to offer workforce training in Ashland.
- We gave North Central Workforce Alliance of Ohio a grant to produce videos about in-demand jobs.

 We supplied grant funding for Junior Achievement of North Central Ohio's financial literacy, entrepreneurship and career readiness programs.

Additionally, ACCF has made a significant investment in the Childcare Initiative led by our Women's Fund. In addition to providing significant administrative support for the initiative, we provided a \$100,000 grant toward construction of the new, nonprofit childcare center. The center will make childcare more accessible for working parents and parents who want to work but otherwise may not be able to find or afford childcare during work hours.

Empowering nonprofits

In Februrary, we hosted "Jumpstart Your Grant Writing," a first-of-its-kind workshop geared toward representatives of local nonprofit organizations who may be new to our grants process or to grant writing in general.

Our message to these nonprofit leaders was simple: We know you're doing great work, and we want to help you with funding.

The informal session gave participants a chance to visit our office, meet our staff and ask questions in a format that may be less intimidating than a cold call or a grant interview.

We covered the basics of our four annual grant cycles and shared some additional ways we can help connect nonprofits with resources to fulfill their missions through important community programs and projects.

In addition to offering value for our guests, this event provided valuable feedback for us as we grow our grant programs and refine our communications with the nonprofits we serve.

building projects that support and enhance our Ashland County community.


